

Your Annual Membership for \$20 supports the cost of the Civic Pride newsletter, management of the website, and other outreach. TAP INTO YOUR INNER ARTIST AT ART HOUSE 7



Nestled in a complex of small businesses on Langston Boulevard, Art House 7 is a staple of the local arts scene and a hidden gem within the Yorktown Civic Association's footprint. Offering classes for anyone aged 2 or older in a comfortable two-story studio, Art House 7's array of teacher offer instruction in drawing, sculpture, painting, ceramics, photography, sewing, fiber arts, and jewelry making.

Art House 7 opened in the fall of 2015, co-founder and owner Ann Brown told the newsletter. Originally occupying just one townhouse in the complex, it expanded to an adjacent unit in 2019 and then added a third unit last year. The latest expansion houses Art House 7's ceramics courses, which are among its most popular courses among students.

Drawing is another favorite among students, as well as a new course—Combining Printmaking and Sewing. When asked which are among the most unique classes available, Ms. Brown identified Japanese Woodblock Printmaking and Suminagashi, or Japanese paper marbling. During a Suminagashi class that Ms. Brown describes as an "incredibly serene and meditate art," students use floating ink on water, creating art, wrapping paper, original stationary, and more—all while enjoying Japanese music and tea.

What if you have no artistic ability? "I believe everyone has artistic ability," Ms. Brown said. "Too often, people gauge their ability solely on their drawing skills. That said, certain classes are designed to alleviate the pressure associated with drawing." Among other classes, she described the ceramics wheel as especially satisfying and plain old engrossing. "Even first-time students can usually produce 4 or 5 pieces they want to keep."

Summer camps are especially popular with local school-aged children. Art House 7 has an "array of camps and classes tailored to artistic exploration," Ms. Brown explained. "Our

offerings include both 2 and 3-hour art camps, with the flexibility for campers to enroll in multiple sessions per day for a comprehensive day of creativity."

Most camps are for students ages 5 to 11, but Art House 7 has a specialized clay camp for 10 to 13-year-old students—a weeklong course where campers learn various hand-building techniques like "pinch, coil, and slab construction, to create whimsical creatures, functional pottery, and/or threedimensional sculptures," Ms. Brown told the newsletter. While the camps are geared toward young campers, Art House 7 maintains a full class roster for middle schoolers, high schoolers, and adults throughout the year.

As Art House 7 continues as a fixture in the local arts community, Ms. Brown hopes to offer courses on cartooning, figure drawing, and etching. The Art House 7 community —"friendly people who love to create, and be around other creative individuals in a relaxed and welcome atmosphere"— will continue to grow and positively impact our community for years to come. If you are interested sampling the Art House 7 community, feel free to check out a "First Friday" event—a free event on the first Friday of every month.

The store has a curated selection of fine art materials for painting, drawing, printmaking, ceramics, and fiber arts.

UPCOMING JENNIFER BUSH-LAWSON 5K & FAMILY CARNIVAL RAISES FUNDS AND FUN



One of the community's most enjoyable and impactful annual events is the Jennifer Bush-Lawson 5K & Family Fun Day. Held every November since 2014, the upcoming 5k & Family Fun Day will be the 10th Annual event.

Mark your calendar for Saturday, November 23 — the Saturday before Thanksgiving — and get ready to head to the Knights of Columbus at 5115 Little Falls Road for the festivities. In addition to a 5K that circles around Nottingham Elementary where it all began, children can participate in a short fun run after the main event. That's not all – moon bounces, laser tag, a rock wall, face painting, face painting, community performances, food, and beverages (including a beer garden) will provide hours of delight.

The morning of activities carries on the legacy of Jennifer Bush-Lawson, a dedicated mother of three and runner who tragically lost her life in a traffic accident in February 2014. Jennifer was passionate about helping other mothers and babies, a dedication that grew from her own complicated pregnancies and her children's stays in the NICU. While she was fortunate to have medical care, Jennifer cared deeply for mothers who could not access the same quality care.

The Jennifer Bush-Lawson Foundation, a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that spearheads the 5K & Family Carnival, among other activities, celebrates and extends Jennifer's passion for maternal and infant health. Its impact has been keenly felt in the region. For instance, the Foundation funded a grant for a telemedicine program at Virginia Hospital Center. "They are no longer having to choose

between their job, which pays the bills, and going to their doctor's appointments," Kelly Garrity, the Foundation's executive director, explained to WUSA in 2020. The Foundation has also focused on providing basics for the moms they serve to include car seats and portable cribs.

VOTING OPPORTUNITIES IN ARLINGTON COUNTY



When this newsletter hits your mailbox, Arlingtonians will soon be heading to the polls to vote in the 2024 general election. As this newsletter is called Civic Pride, the civic association supports you doing your most precious civic duty—casting a ballot for the candidate of your choice.

Arlington County offers a number of ways to vote. Voters can cast ballots on Election Day—Tuesday, November 5, 2024. The polls will be open from 6 AM to 7 PM. The Election Day polling place for many of the residents of this newsletter will be Yorktown High School, but confirm your polling location before Election Day.

Voters can also take advantage of early voting and mail ballot options. Early voting begins on Friday, September 20 and runs through Saturday, November 2. Early voting locations will be at Courthouse Plaza beginning in September, as well as Madison Community Center, Long Bridge Park aquatics center in Crystal City, and Walter Reed Community Center beginning in mid-October. Voters can also apply for a mail ballot. The deadline to do so is 5 PM on October 25.Mail ballots returned by mail must be postmarked on or before November 5 and received by 12 PM on November 8.

Virginia law requires all voters to provide an acceptable form of identification at the polls. Voters arriving at the polls without an acceptable form of ID will be required to either sign an ID Confirmation Statement or vote a provisional ballot. If a voter votes a provisional ballot, they will have until noon on the Friday following the election to deliver a copy of identification to their locality's electoral board or sign an ID Confirmation Statement in order for their provisional ballot to be counted. For a list of acceptable forms of ID for in-person voting, visit https://vote.arlingtonva.gov/Elections/ID-Requirements.

To confirm your registration status, check your polling place, or apply for a mail ballot, visit https://vote.elections.virginia.gov/VoterInformation.

Do you have the time and interest to take your civic duty to the next level? Consider applying to be an election officer, essential positions that serve voters at polling places on Election Day and during early voting. High school students can also work at polling places or can assist with election-related activities. The positions pay by the day. Among other tasks, election officers set up the precinct (including ensuring the equipment is operating properly and signage is placed correctly), check in voters, distribute ballots, and provide assistance in using the voting machines. At the end of Election Day, election officers tabulate the results and clean up the polling place. For more information and to apply, check out https://vote.arlingtonva.gov/Elections/workatpolls.
